#### **BEHIND THE SCENES**

Another month has flown by since Monday 25 July shutdown. All services are still operating in the Orange Light setting in the Covid protection framework as we enter the beginning of Spring with the beautiful new growth, blossoms, and frolicking lambs we have visited on the Cornwall Park walks. I could not believe we are on the countdown to Christmas with only 117 days to go. It has been a busy month for the Activity Centre as we welcomed back all the returning students. The Activity Centre has booked the Papamoa Holiday for the 28 November, goal outings are all go, as are booking for shows, movies, use of the swimming pools etc. On 17 August we treated half of the students to a mid-winter lunch at the Swanson RSA and the second half go on the first and then the 7th of September.

Blossoms brought to mind a recent chat with our gardener Sophie Juttla requesting her profile of her previous interesting work and experiences in the newsletter. It has been a massive undertaking and catch-up working for us for over a year at both Cornwall Park and Ranfurly Road from having no gardener for two years. Glynis is restarting her summer garden project which fell over during Covid, and once again tomato plants in the glass house, and two worm farms to care for. Sadly, the community garden in Onehunga closed that we used to frequent once a week.

We are currently providing services for sixty-nine residents and students plus eight seniors who have their own senior daily timetable. A quick survey of the age of the residents and students shows there are ten people in their twenty's, twenty-three in their thirty's, ten in their 40's, sixteen in their 50s, and ten in the 60s. An interesting mix not that the residents focus on age it is all around friendship and fun.

Whaikaha the new Ministry of Disability have appointed their chief Executive Ms Paula Tesoriero, a Paralympian gold medal winner in the Beijing games.

The services continue to struggle with the amount of staff sickness or catch-up annual leave. Juanita has been a blessing covering staff although is returning soon to USA back in December. The residents are making full use of Duncan House again with April full of current ideas for outings and exercise. With no response in endless adverts for another nurse we are pleased that April Sia is back working in the office Thursdays and Friday.

Brett has been part of the team in many diverse roles for seventeen years until recently working for the police as an Authorised Officer. Regretfully Brett is leaving Ranfurly in September to complete the full police recruitment course.

Letty from CPA is away for three months following surgery. Daniel Kumararajan an enrolled nurse is working part time studying for anaesthesia with MOH working in all departments. Norma Jean Skelton is starting as a housekeeper at CPA and is planning to complete support worker training. Preiyashna Nand is an experienced support worker who will work at CPA. Shirley Lewis is helping by taking the Activity Centre students to the popular Milford craft sessions.

Mike Smith is leaving 26 August 2022 after twenty-one years' service. He has been away since March 2021 due to a bungled back operation and was due back Monday part time. Mike has decided to get a local job because of the travel from Manly, Whangaparoa.

Staff training is high on the agenda with Tricia Dore Q-XCEL onboard to provide a training programme for all staff covering twenty-four topics.

For your interest we have connected with an excellent buddy service 'Forget me Not' run by Carolyn Harris, who we discovered worked at IHC Ranfurly 40 years ago. We reminisced of the past as she knew several of our residents. Hannah (Ranfurly's Wellbeing Counsellor and Social Worker) has been flexible in attempting to support staff and meet the needs of the residents/students. Grief and loss support has been provided to residents who have lost family members over the last few months.

By Friday, the two security entrance gate motors will have been replaced now with a battery back-up. Duncan House is in the throes of being refurbished. All windows are now double glazed, a lift ordered from overseas, sixty doors and kitchen cupboards sprayed lacquered white, the interior repainted, some new drapes and white slat blinds for all rooms except the 6.4 metres front windows with the 180-degree vista. We are eternally grateful for the amazing gift enjoyed by so many from our deceased resident Ian Duncan's family.

We all send our best wishes to a Ranfurly member Georgia Jensen Proctor who is recovering very successfully from an operation.

Congratulations to staff Anthony, Rupa, and Chis on obtaining New Zealand residency after an extremely long wait.

We went to Endless Metals, Scrap Metal Recycling in Onehunga to load black bags with coke cans and weigh our cans. We all have lots of money \$18.




